The Gold Rush



Did you know: Gold rushes happened in other places before California?

The Georgia Gold Rush started in 1829. So much gold was mined in the town of Dahlonega, Georgia that a United States Mint was established there to make coins from the gold. The Indian Removal Act of 1830 that led to the Trail of Tears helped open that area up for mining.

Even earlier, in 1690, a gold rush began in Brazil in South America. The Brazilian Gold Rush continues to this day, since gold is still being found there.

Refer to the map on page 24 to gather information about how people got to California to participate in the Gold Rush.

A hopeful gold miner might leave Independence, Missouri with other gold seekers and also settlers headed toward Oregon. The California and Oregon Trails share the same route until they split apart in the Rocky Mountains.
